Suellen Saidee Cook March Guest Speaker



At the March club meeting, members were privileged to be addressed by Suellen Cook on her area of expertise, digital fine art.

Suellen brought along prints of many of her imaginative images, including "The Lighthouse" series. Not only did we see a selection of Suellen's work, we were guided through the steps involved in building a composite image.

It took no imagination to understand the high level of Photoshop skills involved. Fascinating to see a house, then add an extension, a chimney, a door or windows. In the window, add what you can see through a window and add light. Incredible.

For each project, Suellen develops a shopping list of images she requires. Then she goes out searching for those items to photograph. Launceston, with its collection of heritage buildings, is a good source of images. To say we were impressed by Suellen's digital fine art is an understatement.

Alchemist by profession, and owner-operator of the Homeopathic Pharmacy in Brisbane Street, Frank Styant Browne (FSB) was the driving force behind the formation of the Northern Tasmanian Camera Club (NTCC) on 21 July 1889.

The meeting was held at his pharmacy premises

FSB was a foundation member of NTCC. He served as Secretary, Treasurer and Librarian for years

FSB served as Secretary of NTCC for 22 years.

He played a predominant part in setting up NTCC and guiding it with meticulous care through its early years.

In February 1911, he had served on the committee for 22 years. The club presented him with a volume of its best prints. The President at the time, R L Parker said" Nothing can adequately recompense Mr. Browne for his invaluable service for the past 22 years. He has been the life and soul of the Club."

In the summer of 1896 and the autumn of 1899, he and Joshua Higgs travelled around Tasmania on two separate holidays and captured the Tasmanian countryside in photographs. These memoirs and photographs were published in the book "Voyages in a Caravan".

FSB is one of the recognised wilderness photographers of Tasmania, as featured in "Into the Wild" (wilderness photography in Tasmania.

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#### **Judging Paradoxes**

President Steve at the March club meeting gave two examples where images in different competitions scored vastly different marks e.g. 13 and 8. Peter Watson in his book "Views Across the Landscape" deals with this issue. "Without doubt, beauty is in the eye of the beholder. No individual artwork has ever attracted universal acclaim, and art can only be judged subjectively. I fully accept that what appeals to me will not always be appreciated by others."

Evaluating a photo is a subjective process, not an objective exercise. Measuring the temperature of a container of liquid, or timing a footrace are objective processes. What you see is what you get.

Judging photos is a subjective process based on a person's background, education, life experiences, preferences etc. There is also the issue of group think where in a club or organisation, many members, or an influential clique reach a consensus on certain values e.g. landscapes are superior to portraits or other genres.

Our club's approach of using different experienced judges each month safeguards against the pitfalls of judging.

## Appreciation Award

This month's Appreciation Award goes to Suellen Saidee Cook who delivered a stunning presentation of digital fine art photography, including the steps involved in producing her imaginative images. Suellen drove up from Hobart to make her powerful presentation to club members. I don't believe there was anyone in the audience who was not amazed by the quality of the images.

In addition, Suellen judged the March club competition for colour and monochrome images. Her judging comments were a textbook example of how to give positive feedback. Specifically, Suellen advised how members could achieve stronger monochrome images with simple adjustments of Levels in Photoshop


