

Suggestions by Cam Blake on Landscape Photography

Take one shot and get it right

Shoot Apeture Priority all the time to give better control of depth of field

Use small aperture (f16) for large landscape views for deep depth of field; Use wide aperture E.g f2.8 to separate foreground and midground.

Don't shoot Manual

Time of day is critical - early morning and late afternoon are the best times

Get there 45 minutes before sunrise and 60 minutes before sunset, get organised and wait for the light

Black and White Photography: Wild weather gives great black and white photos. Showery days give great shots when the sun comes out.

Get it right in the camera.

Process images routinely in Lightroom.
