Adobe Camera Raw (ACR) and Lightroom Workshop at Lions Clubrooms Saturday 13th August Workshop Presenter Steve Whitworth

Fourteen members participated in the workshop developed and presented by Club President, Steve Whitworth. Participants were able to work on the same images on their laptops as Steve was illustrating on the television screen.

At the outset, Steve explained that he was entirely selftaught without any formal qualification. He advised those present that they could make significant improvements to their images by using automatic adjustments.

Steve strongly recommended that participants check out the blogs of Julianne Kost on Google. They are well presented and easy to follow.

For routine processing of images from their cameras, Steve recommended that people use Abode Bridge and Adobe Camera Raw (ACR). Images are downloaded from the camera and sorted in Adobe Bridge.

Steve then demonstrated how images can be processed and classified with Adobe Bridge. The second half of the workshop was devoted to the processing of images from Bridge with ACR.

Participants were able to perform the procedures demonstrated by Steve on their laptops. Where a participant became stuck, Steve was there to sort out the problem. Nobody got left behind.


The consensus of participants was that the workshop was very successful, and a model for future workshops.

This composite aerial photograph was the first of its kind in Australia. It was commissioned by the City of Launceston in 1922, and King was chosen as the photographer because of his existing experience with aerial photography.



The John King and Sons motorcycle showroom and garage on the corner of Kingsway and Brisbane Street. The building is still there but has been re-purposed.



Speed trials at Rocherlea 1923

Herbert King loved speed from a young age. He loved pushing the limits of what was possible with mechanical transport, from bicycles to motorcycles, cars, and later, aeroplanes. He took part in motorcycle races, reliability trials and took motor vehicles into the bush to places no vehicle had yet reached. (Source: QVMAG).



The Northern Tasmanian Camera Club competition shield 1880 – 1940. This shield represents the competition element of club membership. Herbert John King's name appears on it a number of times demonstrating his dominance of the competition.



HJ King was also an accomplished nature photographer. He was President of the Launceston Field Naturalists Club for many years. The above photo of a thylacine looking towards Cradle Mountain in 1933 is one of the most well-known photographs produced by King. He photographed the thylacine in captivity at Beaumaris Zoo and made a special trip to Cradle Mountain to capture this specific view. The iconic composite image has been used extensively. 

Tips for Close up Photography Some tips from the meeting



- Extreme close up means struggling for light and depth of field
- Use tripod or otherwise, keep stationary
- Still subjects
- Mirror lockup if relevant
- Use full workable ISO range
- Manual focussing
- Focus bracketing if you've got it
- Focus rail helps with extreme magnification
- Added light needs to be even (ring or multiple flashes, light tents


