

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

### DYNAMIC RANGE IN PHOTOGRAPHY



# Presentation by Donn Corcoran at the November Club Meeting

An understanding of dynamic range is important for obtaining the best possible image quality in photography, particularly where lighting conditions are challenging.

Put simply, dynamic range is the ratio of luminance values, from dark to bright, that can be found in a photographic subject, captured by a camera, and displayed as a print or projected digital image.

Modern cameras can capture a wide dynamic range and photo-editing software can enhance the translation of the captured image to a displayed image. Although the dynamic range of photographic scenes can exceed the dynamic range of even the best cameras, in most cases good photographic techniques and good processing can yield excellent final results from single exposures. Processing may involve adjusting brightness, contrast and other aspects of the whole image, or selective adjustments, using masking and related techniques.

In some cases, such as night photography and real estate scenes involving interior and exterior views simultaneously, extreme dynamic range is best addressed by taking multiple exposures and blending them in software designed for high dynamic range (HDR)images.

Many cameras have inbuilt capabilities for bracketing multiple exposures and bracketing can easily be done manually. This is best done using a tripod, aperture priority setting, and a remote shutter release, to minimise camera movement between shots.

There are several specialist programs, such as Photomatix, for processing multiple images, and most general-purpose photo-editing software now includes HDR capabilities. Some photographers prefer to use more complex blending techniques, using layers and selective adjustments of luminance to get better results than can be obtained with HDR software.


