



Secretary Jack Barker has established a Facebook Messenger Group.

If a member is interested to go out and take photos. E.g. a night shooting event, they can post their intention on Facebook Messenger which is delivered to other Facebook Messenger members phones.

If interested, members can reply. Not interested, no action is required.

Facebook Messenger may be useful for women who feel there is safety in numbers. It also provides an opportunity for members to get to know each other better.

Photographic opportunities can arise at short notice e.g the red sky of the golden hour before sunrise and after sunset.

Members not using Facebook can still participate in Facebook Messenger,

Anyone can suggest a meeting, and these are separate from official club events.

Where there is tundra, the pipeline has been elevated so that the hot oil flowing through it won't melt the frozen tundra.




Enchanted Forest, along the Dalton Highway. These trees are covered with frost due to the extreme cold. (Temperatures were around -26C).
